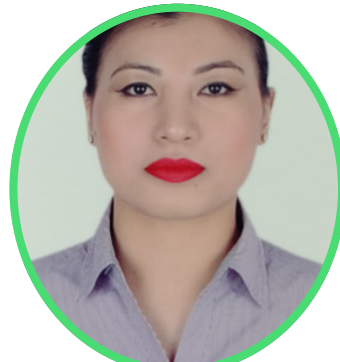

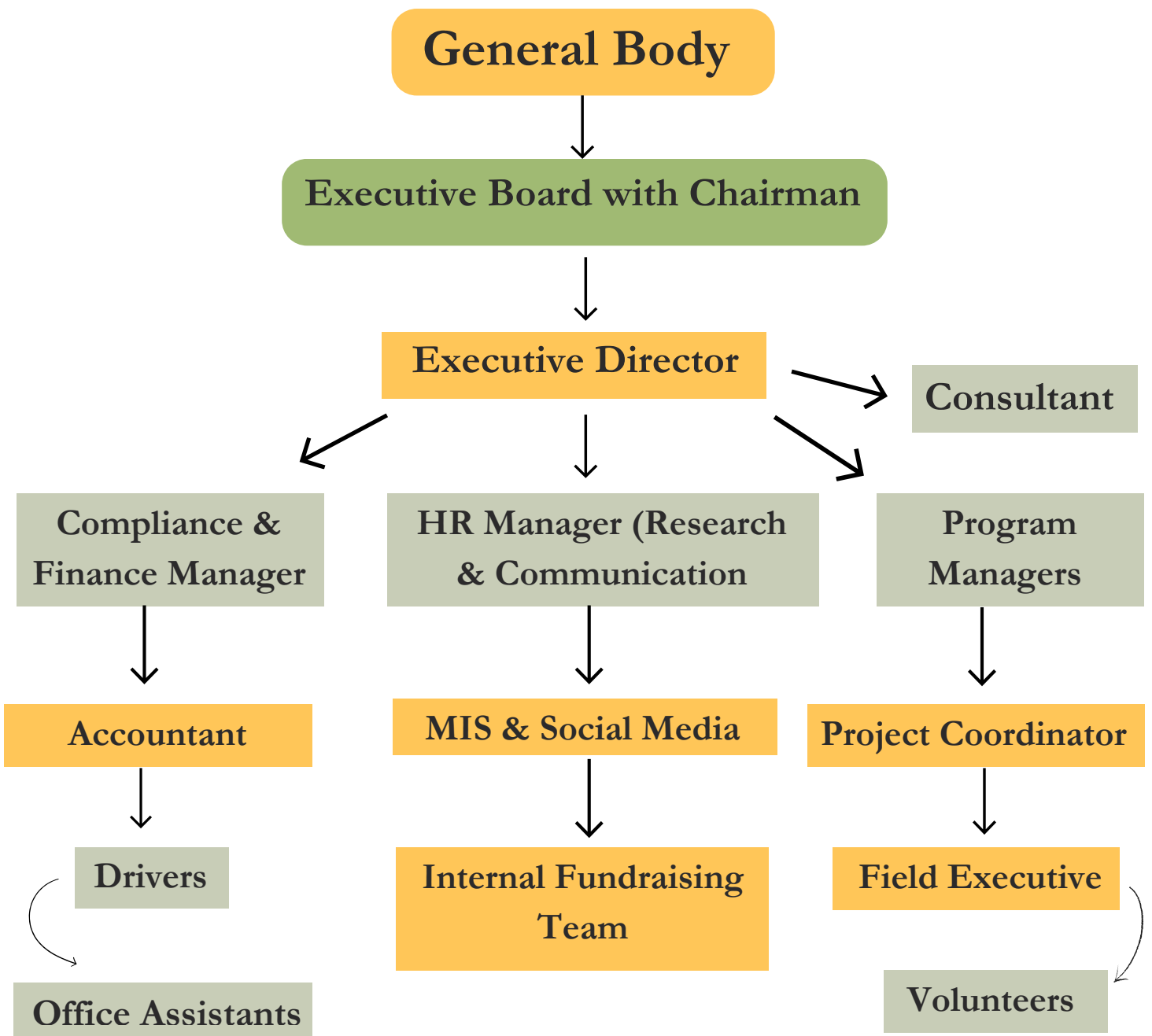

# About Us

People's Endeavour for Social Changes (PESCH) is a grassroots-focused NGO established in 1997 and ISO certified (Certification No. 305024012301Q of 2024), committed to empowering marginalized communities in Northeast India. The organization works with a holistic and participatory approach to development, prioritizing sustainable livelihoods, natural resource management, women's economic inclusion, value education and community-led institutional strengthening.

PESCH's livelihood initiatives focus on promoting indigenous kitchen gardening and the adoption of Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT), which enhances climate-resilient farming on hilly terrains. To support income diversification, PESCH has established livestock banks that include piggery, goatery, and country chicken farming. The organization also invests in youth and women skill development through value addition of locally available forest fruits and traditional handicrafts, while promoting scientific nursery farming of GI-tagged Tamenglong oranges, Naga King chillies, and other local forest species. Seed banks are being developed to preserve and enhance indigenous crop varieties.

In the realm of natural resource management and climate action, PESCH emphasizes regeneration of locally available forest fruits, orchard-based SALT farming systems, and the promotion of agro-tourism. It undertakes extensive tree plantation drives in community reserved forests and promotes community stewardship over forests and local resources to restore and protect biodiversity and ecosystem health. By revitalizing the cultural heritage and economic potential of villages like Sibilong and Nungkao, PESCH envisions a future where marginalized communities can reclaim their dignity, self-reliance, and rightful place in a just and inclusive society.



The organization also works to strengthen value-based education by supporting the revival of local primary education systems, organizing capacity building for Anganwadi and ASHA workers and establishing local libraries to preserve community knowledge and practices. Environmental education and disaster preparedness are integral to PESCH's outreach in vulnerable areas.



PESCH places a strong emphasis on women's economic inclusion through the construction of dedicated women-led rural markets and by facilitating credit linkages for women's self-help groups. Through consistent efforts in institutional building and fostering convergence with government and civil society networks, PESCH continues to drive participatory, rights-based development in some of the most remote and underserved regions of Northeast India.

# Milestones of the Year 2024–2025

## 1. Institutional Building

- Formed 17 new Women Self Help Groups (SHGs) to strengthen women's collective initiatives.
- 12 Youth Clubs were strengthened to enhance youth engagement in community development.
- 6 Village Planning Committees (VPCs) were strengthened with a focus on monitoring and participatory village planning.
- Established linkages of 3 Village Level Federations (VO/VLFs) with the Manipur State Rural Livelihood Mission (MSRLM) for livelihood convergence and sustainability.

## 2. Livelihood Promotion

- Established 6 Livestock Banks (piggery and goatery) across 4 villages to ensure sustainable access to livestock resources.
- Supported 84 farmers in homestead farming for diversified income generation and household nutrition.
- 60 farmers accessed livestock from the banks to start their own livestock nurseries, contributing to local income growth.

## 3. Natural Resource Management (NRM) and Climate Change Adaptation

- Supported 324 farmers in adopting the SALT (Sloping Agricultural Land Technology) model for soil and water conservation.
- Distributed 37,000 orchard saplings (citrus, banana, pineapple, etc.) to promote agroforestry and sustainable farming.
- Encouraged 120 households to practice organic kitchen gardening for food security and nutrition enhancement.
- Strengthened 12 Forest Resource and Livelihood Security (FORLIS) groups with the plantation of 19,000 locally available species to restore degraded forest areas.
- Sibilong village developed an Agro-Ecotourism initiative centered on GI Tagged Tamenglong Orange and Naga King Chilli, linking conservation with income generation.
- Established 3 community nurseries of GI Tagged Tamenglong Orange with 2,30,000 saplings for sustainable propagation.
- Installed 10,000 litres of water storage capacity through pitcher drum-based rainwater harvesting systems in SALT farms to ensure water availability in dry seasons.

## 4. Skill Development and Market Linkage

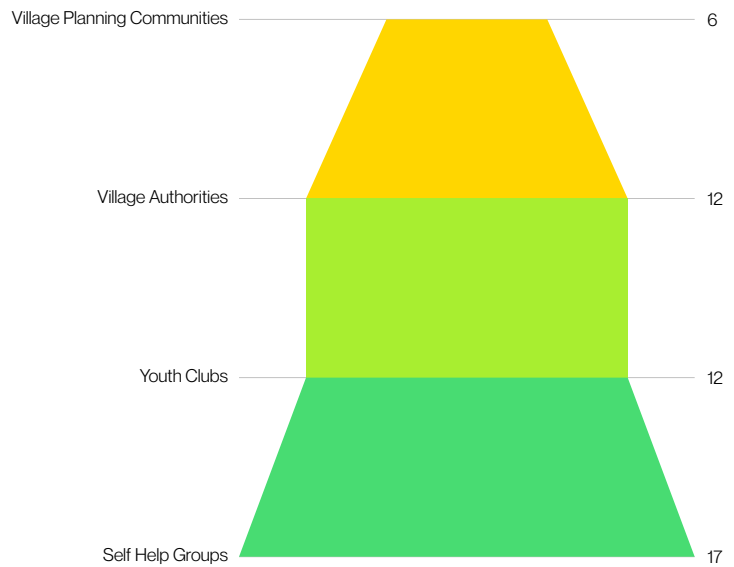
- Trained 500 participants on:
  - Payments for Ecosystem Services (PES)
  - Plantation and Pest Management
  - Harvest and Post-Harvest Management
- Provided skill training on mushroom farming to 24 individuals for livelihood diversification.
- Organized a Farmer Festival at Ramgaizang, Cachar (Assam) to promote knowledge exchange and market networking.
- Constructed a Rural Haat at Katangbeukam, Tamenglong, providing a permanent platform for SHGs and farmers to sell their products.



# Capacity & Institutional Building

Institutional building was one of the key objectives aimed at strengthening the village governance system. We also extended support for the formation and promotion of SHGs and facilitated their linkage with MSRLM (Manipur State Rural Livelihoods Mission). Through our intervention, several SHGs could access funds from MSRLM, thereby enhancing their ability to undertake income-generating activities and build sustainable livelihoods.

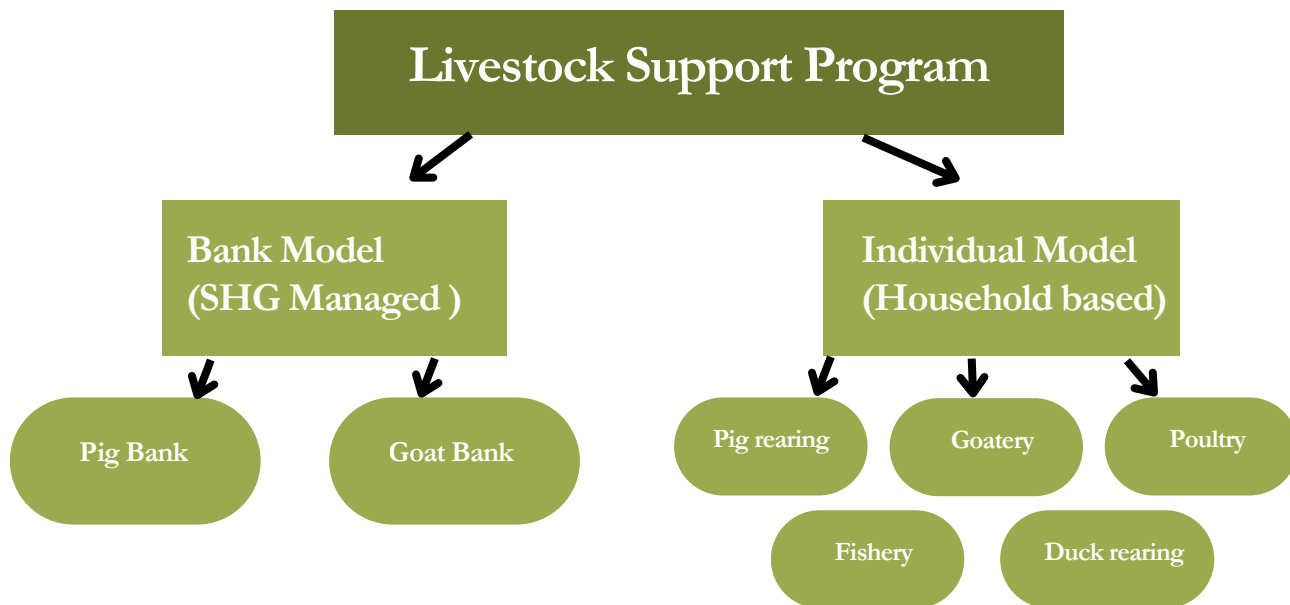
This institutional strengthening process not only improved community participation and leadership but also ensured greater transparency, accountability, and inclusiveness within the village governance system. 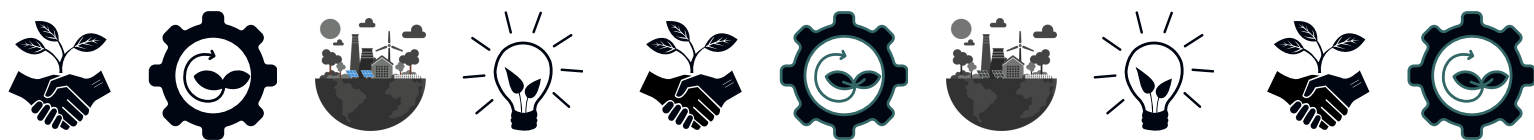

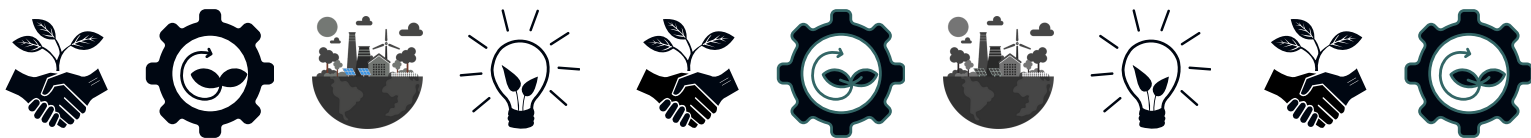

# Sustainable Livelihood

## Individual Beneficiary Case story- Duck rearing

In Chingkhong village of Tousem block, Manipur, Miss Pantiliu started Muscovy duck rearing with support from the BfdW/BROT project. She successfully sold 21 ducklings to neighboring villages for rearing and meat purposes. Encouraged by her success, Pantiliu motivates others to take up duck rearing as a profitable livelihood option. Through this initiative, PESCH has supported 80 women farmers in duckery rearing.



# Sustainable Livelihood

## Pig & Goat Bank Initiative – Community-Led Livelihood Support

As part of PESCH's livestock development program, the Pig and Goat Bank initiative is implemented through **Self-Help Groups (SHGs)** to enhance household income, food security, and community resilience.

The process begins with community consultations, where village meetings are conducted to identify interested stakeholders and select suitable SHGs based on their capacity and commitment to manage the livestock banks. The SHGs, in consultation with us, choose accessible locations on community land for **constructing pig sty or goat shelters**. We supports the construction by providing essential materials such as GI sheets for roofing and cement, while encouraging the use of locally available resources to ensure sustainability and cost-efficiency.

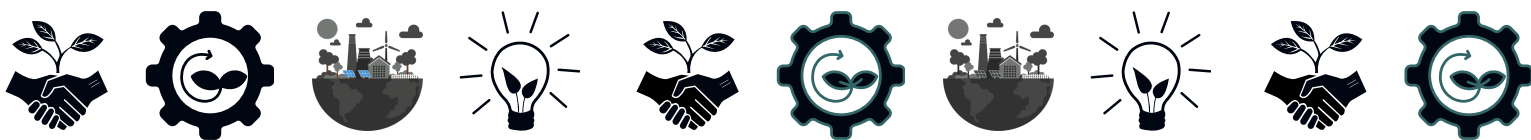


**Each livestock bank receives six piglets** purchased through the project, along with necessary veterinary support, including medicines and feed. The management structure is built around collective participation; **10 SHG members take turns caring for the pigs rotationally**, ensuring shared responsibility and skill development.

To strengthen technical knowledge, we **train local women, known as Pashu Sakhis**, in livestock management practices, ensuring expert guidance is available within the village.

Once the pigs mature, PESCH plans to support the sale of piglets, grown pigs, and pork products in local markets to create a sustainable value chain that benefits farmers and the wider community. By enabling farmers to access local buyers and markets, the initiative aims to strengthen income opportunities and promote collective entrepreneurship. At this early stage, the focus is on building market linkages, developing distribution networks, and ensuring that the income generated from these sales is reinvested within the Self-Help Groups (SHGs) to support the growth of the pig bank and other community-driven activities.

This community-driven model not only empowers families economically but also promotes cooperative management, local leadership, and resource sharing, laying the groundwork for long-term, resilient livelihoods in rural areas.



# Sustainable Livelihood

## Pig & Goat Bank Initiative – Community-Led Livelihood Support

### Case story of ITEUCHU SHG Pig Bank Deige Village

In Deige village, Iteuchu Self Help Group (SHG) was formed by PESCH with support from the Azim Premji Foundation has transformed their livelihoods through a Pig Bank initiative. Before the project implementation they were not aware about the Pig Bank.

They receive training on pig rearing also trained Pashu Sakhi visit and guide them. The group introduced a rotation wise feeding system, the SHG now breeds pigs, and sold in the village with minimum price so that every family could afford to buy and rear pig. This generates regular income for its members, now the SHG group plans to expand the numbers of pigs and strengthen this sustainable livelihood model.



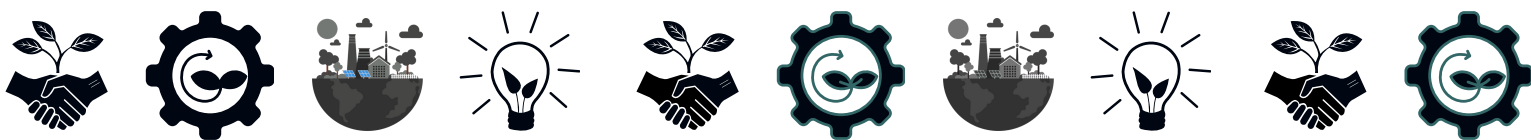
### Longchai's Journey to Become a Goat Village

Longchai is a small village with 52 household where most families depend on farming and daily labor to earn a living. Life is not always easy, and people often look for new ways to support their families. In Longchai, families have always kept a few goats. But earlier, goat rearing was done individually, without much planning or support.

With the Azim Premji Foundation (APF) project's intervention, the Goat Bank was introduced. The project gave 10 goats to the community and now increase to 30 goats. The Village Planning Committee are taking the responsibility of managing the Goat Bank. The purpose of the bank is to increase livestock rearing in the village so that more families can benefit. The villagers are also receiving support from a Pashu Sakhi — a trained local resource person who helps with animal care, vaccination, treatment & castration services. Earlier, families struggled when their goats fell sick. Now, timely help is available right at their doorstep. Giving them the confidence to rear goats more effectively and reduce losses.

Among the 12 pashu sakhis, **Athui Gonmei** from Longchai village received the best pashu sakhi award with certificate & a cash prize of Rs. 10,000/- from PESCH. He successfully sold 30 goats from his goat bank.

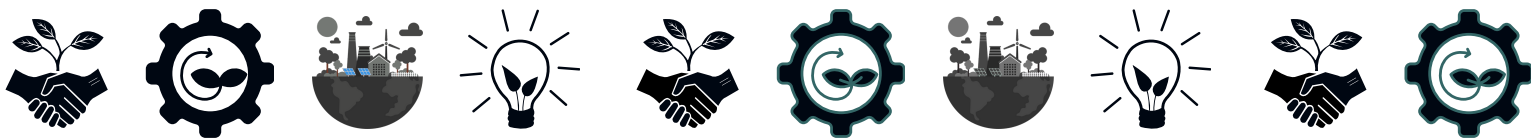
The VPC put up the agenda in Village General Meeting, it was resolved to establish a “goat village”. The village also decided one day in a week for market day. This change is bringing many benefits. The Goat Bank is giving new hope to Longchai. With the VPC leading the effort, people are already planning to make their village a true “Goat Village,” where every family can earn more, eat better, and build a stronger future together.

# Natural Resource Management (NRM) & Climate Change

## SALT Farming – Promoting Sustainable Livelihood

Horticulture farming has been a key livelihood intervention supported by PESCH, benefiting **402 farming households** through the adoption of the **Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT)** model. This approach fosters soil conservation, sustainable land use, and integrated farming systems tailored to hilly terrains.

Under this initiative, PESCH distributed **37,000 high-value fruit and plantation saplings** across **17 villages in Tousem block and Cachar area**. These efforts have significantly enhanced agricultural productivity and provided long-term income opportunities for farming families.



### Key impacts of the program include:

- Promotion of sustainable agricultural practices through diversified cropping systems.
- Improved economic prospects by establishing perennial orchards and plantation crops with assured market value.
- Conservation of biodiversity by reducing soil erosion and maintaining ecological balance.
- Strengthening household resilience with climate-adaptive income sources.

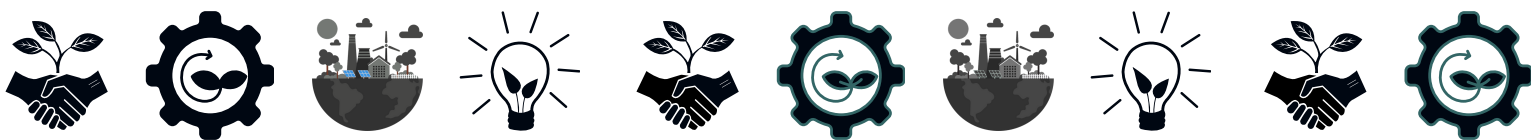
## GI Tag Tamenglong orange community nursery farming

In Sibilong village, PESCH supported a Self-Help Group (SHG) to establish an GI Tag Tamenglong orange community nursery. This initiative aimed to protect GI Tag Tamenglong orange, empower women, promote financial inclusion, and uplift marginalized groups through their active participation in nursery management. The effort also seeks to position Sibilong as a model Orange Nursery Village, ensuring sustainable livelihoods and supply of quality saplings for the community.



## Organic Kitchen Garden

Support kitchen gardens to 120 households across six villages of Tousem. These gardens promoted the consumption of locally grown, nutrient-rich produce, improving household dietary diversity and overall health.



# Natural Resource Management (NRM) & Climate Change

## Agro-Eco Tourism Initiative – Integrating Sustainable Agriculture and Rural Livelihoods

In 2024–2025, PESCH launched a focused Agro-Eco Tourism initiative in Sibilong village, aimed at integrating sustainable agriculture with tourism-based livelihoods. The program demonstrates how climate-resilient farming can support economic growth while promoting environmental conservation.

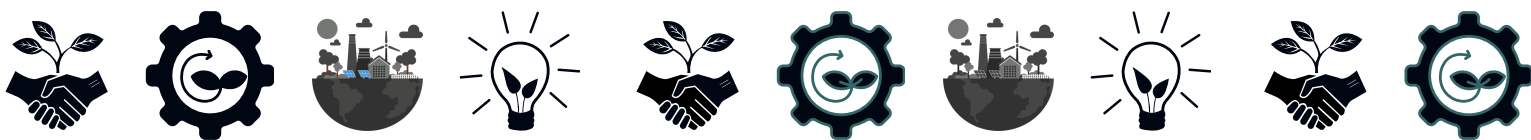
**Gaisinglung Kamei**, a progressive farmer from Sibilong village in Tamenglong district, Manipur, was selected as the model farmer for this initiative. With over a decade of farming experience, he is recognized in his community for his commitment and innovative practices. The Village Planning Committee (VPC), in coordination with PESCH, conducted field verification and community consultations to identify a farmer who could showcase the **Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) farming model**. Among three applicants, Gaisinglung was chosen based on land ownership, interest, and farming potential.

Prior to PESCH's intervention, orange cultivation in the area faced low productivity and limited output. The Agro-Eco Tourism project seeks to enhance large-scale orange production by promoting horticulture best practices and providing capacity-building support to farmers.

As part of the intervention, Gaisinglung received:

- Training on SALT farming techniques, agro-ecotourism, GI tags, and pest management.
- High-value saplings, including nitrogen-fixing plants for field plantation.
- Close technical monitoring and on-field guidance throughout the cultivation process.
- Integrated livestock support, including Muscovy ducks as part of the SALT model and bee box for beekeeping with specialized training.
- Construction of a homestay for visitors, aimed at hosting guests from government departments and other stakeholders, with plans to begin operations in the following year.

This initiative not only improves agricultural productivity but also empowers rural communities by diversifying income sources, promoting sustainable practices, and enhancing tourism potential—all aligned with PESCH's mission to foster self-reliance and ecological stewardship.

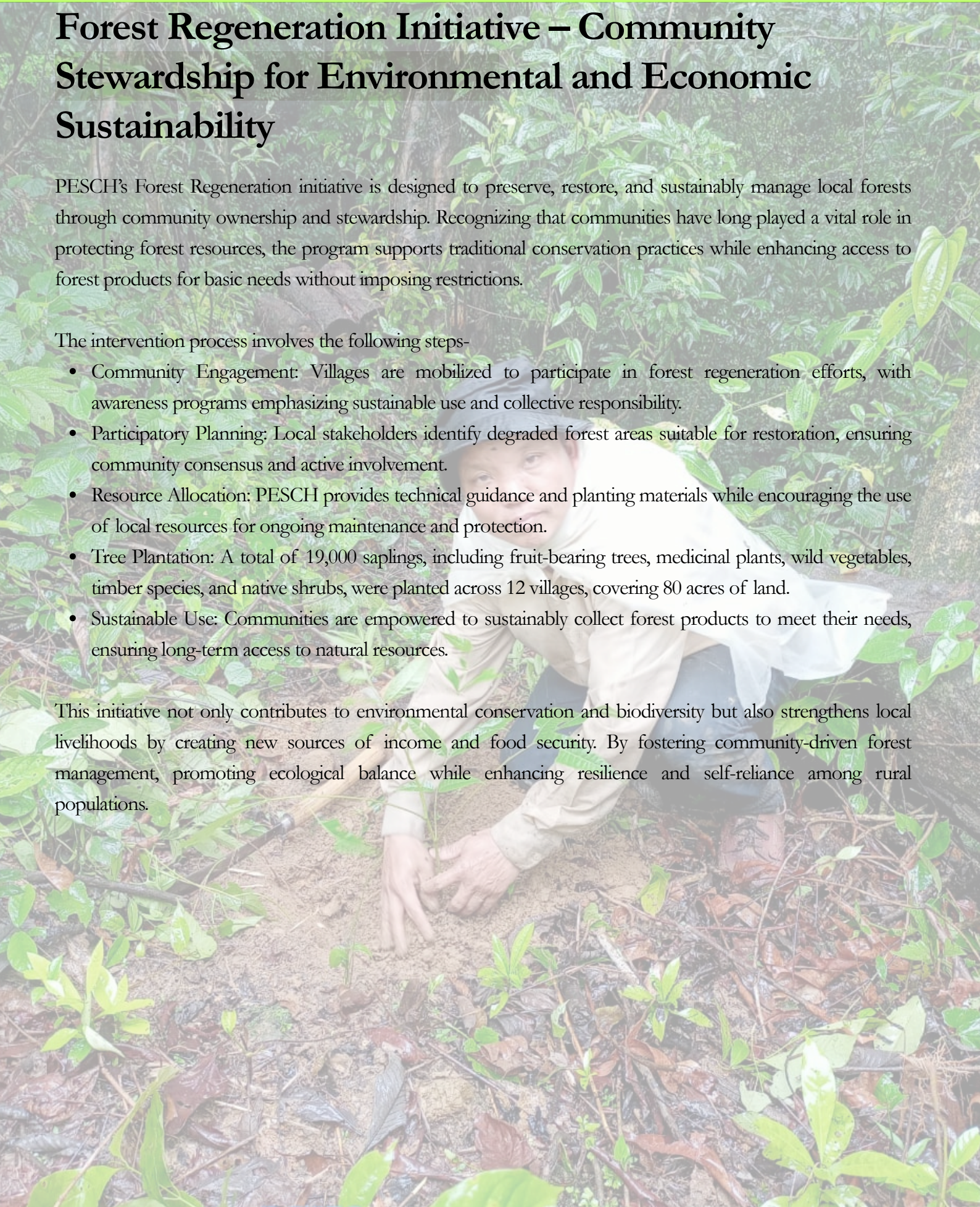
## Forest Regeneration Initiative – Community Stewardship for Environmental and Economic Sustainability

PESCH's Forest Regeneration initiative is designed to preserve, restore, and sustainably manage local forests through community ownership and stewardship. Recognizing that communities have long played a vital role in protecting forest resources, the program supports traditional conservation practices while enhancing access to forest products for basic needs without imposing restrictions.

The intervention process involves the following steps-

- **Community Engagement:** Villages are mobilized to participate in forest regeneration efforts, with awareness programs emphasizing sustainable use and collective responsibility.
- **Participatory Planning:** Local stakeholders identify degraded forest areas suitable for restoration, ensuring community consensus and active involvement.
- **Resource Allocation:** PESCH provides technical guidance and planting materials while encouraging the use of local resources for ongoing maintenance and protection.
- **Tree Plantation:** A total of 19,000 saplings, including fruit-bearing trees, medicinal plants, wild vegetables, timber species, and native shrubs, were planted across 12 villages, covering 80 acres of land.
- **Sustainable Use:** Communities are empowered to sustainably collect forest products to meet their needs, ensuring long-term access to natural resources.

This initiative not only contributes to environmental conservation and biodiversity but also strengthens local livelihoods by creating new sources of income and food security. By fostering community-driven forest management, promoting ecological balance while enhancing resilience and self-reliance among rural populations.



# Skill Development & Market Linkages

As part of the Sustainable Livelihood Program, the organization has taken significant steps to strengthen market linkages for farmers, women's Self-Help Groups (SHGs), and local entrepreneurs by creating accessible and sustainable marketplaces where agricultural produce, forest products, and handicrafts can be promoted and sold.

On 3rd December 2024, the **P. Hulang Rural Haat at Katangbeukam**, Tousem sub-division, was virtually inaugurated by **Shri Partha Mandal, GM/OIC, NABARD Manipur Regional Office, Imphal**. The initiative was funded by the National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) and implemented by People's Endeavour for Social Changes (PESCH). This rural haat marks a significant milestone in empowering the rural communities of Tousem sub-division, the haat has revived the local marketplace culture with a special focus on women's entrepreneurship and weekly community markets.



Continuing this momentum, on 28th January 2025, PESCH and the communities of Lakhinagar GP inaugurated the **Rani Gaidinliu Bazaar** at Ramgaizang village. The event was graced by **Shri Kaushik Rai, Hon'ble Cabinet Minister of Food, Public Distribution & Consumer Affairs, Mines and Minerals, Barak Valley Development, Govt. of Assam**. Created through collaboration with the Lungbungzang Area Village Council, the Rani Gaidinliu Bazaar Committee, Luh Phuum, and the Youth Club. The market was named in honor of Rani Gaidinliu, Padma Bhushan awardee, freedom fighter, and political leader of India, as a symbol of inspiration for women and community-based economic empowerment. The event drew thousands of people, including dignitaries, local PRI representatives, CSOs, and community leaders, reinforcing the importance of collective community participation in livelihood promotion.

To celebrate the inauguration, the Tribal Indigenous Crops & Handicraft Harvest Festival 2025 was organized on 29th January 2025. The festival was attended by **Shri Nabin Kumar Roy, General Manager, NABARD Assam Regional Office, Guwahati**, along with guests of honour including Shri Rabishankar Likmabam, DDM NABARD Cachar, Shri Pradyut Bhattacharjee, Executive Director, SeSTA, Shri Dimgong Rongmei, Executive Director, RNBA, and Shri Saurabh Sharma, North East Together.

# Rani Gaidinilu Bazaar Inauguration

The festival showcased the rich cultural heritage and entrepreneurial potential of the indigenous communities.

Highlights included:

- Traditional folk songs, dances, and cultural performances.
- Demonstrations of traditional knowledge, such as fire-making and drum-beating.
- A dedicated exhibition space where women SHGs displayed creative handicrafts and local products.

Through these sustained efforts, the organization has not only revived traditional rural markets but also created dynamic spaces that foster entrepreneurship, cultural identity, and sustainable livelihoods across communities in Manipur and the Barak Valley of Assam.



# Integrated Pest Management Training

PESCH conducted a much-needed Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Training in the villages of Sibilong, Longchai, and Aben. Expert sessions were facilitated by Dr. Adam Kamei, Plant Protection Officer (Plant Pathology), Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India, and Dr. Sabbithi Pavan, Assistant Professor (Entomology), Nagaland University. As part of the training, the NPPS Mobile App was introduced to farmers, enabling them to identify pests and diseases and receive real-time advisories. A total of 35 farmers successfully registered on the app during the session.

Through the program, farmers realized the importance of pest identification before spraying chemicals seed treatment and gained practical skills in pruning, compost making, and plant nutrition. The training also strengthened collaboration between PESCH and the Central Integrated Pest Management Centre (CIPMC), Imphal, ensuring timely expert support for local farmers.



## Mushroom Training

Mushroom cultivation training was provided to 24 SHG members at the PESCH office and in two project villages to enhance rural livelihoods and increase household income. As a result, participants gained practical knowledge in mushroom production, developed skills in spawn preparation and cultivation techniques, and several members have already started small-scale mushroom units for income generation.



# SPORTS & DISASTER RESPONSE

PESCH organized a two-day **Annual Sports Meet** for six villages in Aben, Tousem Block. The event aimed to uplift local youth through sports, revive traditional games, and create new circles of friendship. It also provided a platform for a cultural night, where participants showcased their skills and shared farming practices from different villages. Both youth and women actively participated in the tournament, making the event more inclusive and vibrant. Alongside the sports activities, awareness sessions were conducted on drug abuse, health, global village, and climate change, enriching the community with knowledge and dialogue.



## Flood Relief Work

On 06 June 2024 PESCH has distributed flood relief materials to the peoples effected by flooded in Jiribam & Cachar district of Assam. With supported from **Mariwala Health Initiated (MHI) Mumbai.**
